### Road construction measures

### How to find us

Tutzing is located approximately 35 km southwest of Munich on Lake Starnberg (Starnberger See).



From Munich Central Station (Hauptbahnhof): Take the urban railway S6 (S-Bahn) or the regional train (RB) to Tutzing. At the train station in Tutzing, take the Bus 958 or 978 to "Klenzestraße". You will also find cabs at the front entrance of Tutzing train station. From the airport take the urban railway S1 or S8 to Munich Central Station and follow the instructions above.



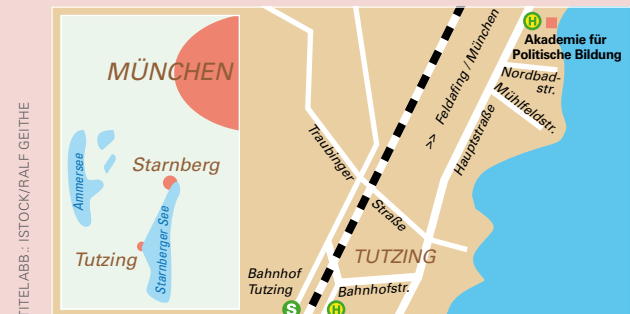
You can also reach the Academy by foot from Tutzing train station. It takes you 20 to 30 minutes.
